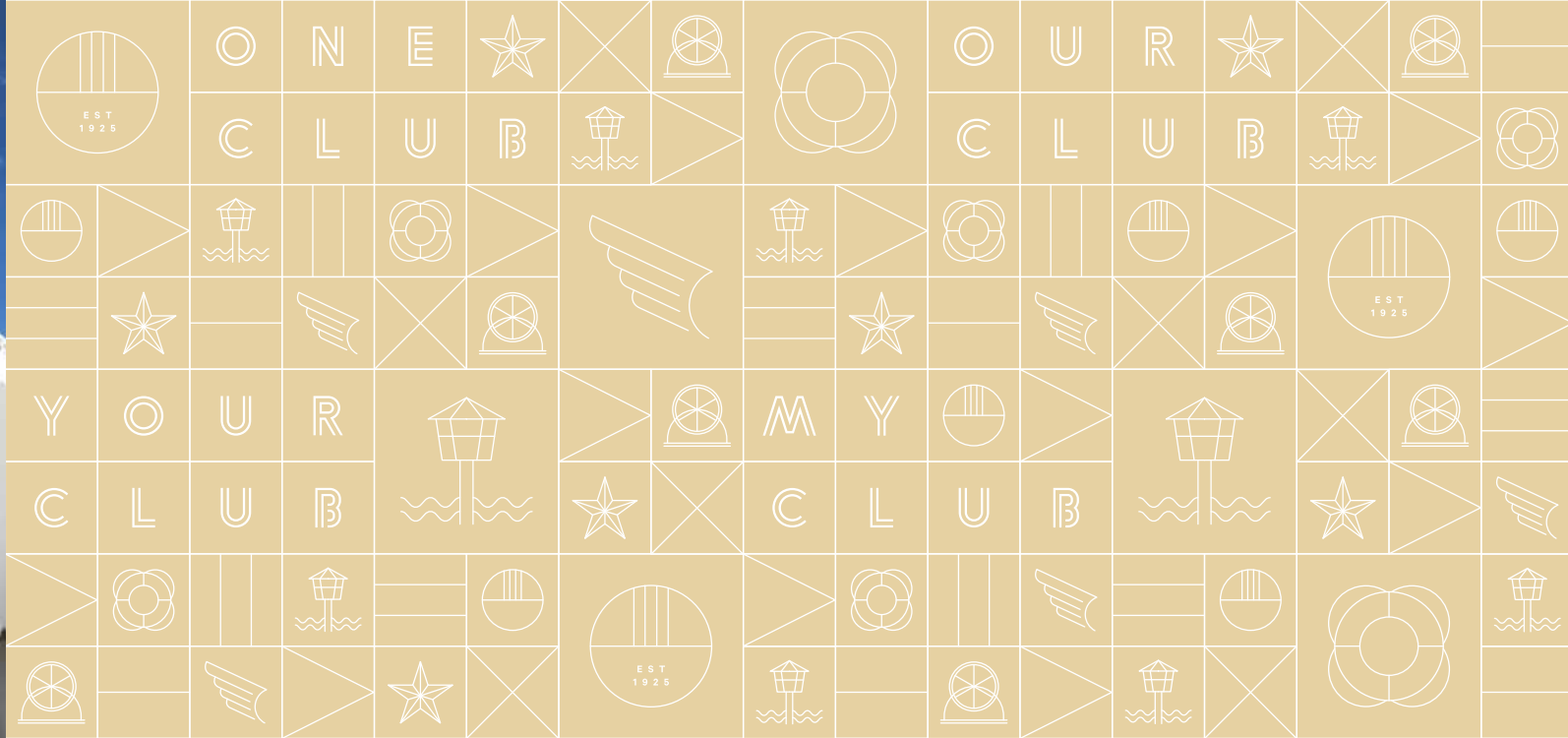

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# PRESIDENT REPORT

It is with pleasure that I present the 2018/19 Annual Report. We have been occupying our clubrooms for three years now and we continue to negotiate all of the opportunities of operating in this building.



The overall management of surf life saving clubs continues to evolve. This evolution is influencing and defining our culture as a contemporary surf life saving and community club as we move into the future. We have an ongoing focus on our relevance in the broader community with health and well being activities central to our strategic plan.

Our membership has grown to 1,656 members in the last year. Our Administration team has done a wonderful job in ensuring our gym facility is kept in excellent condition and in implementing a range of initiatives to secure memberships: as a result, the training for seniors program and the early morning group training sessions continue to grow in popularity.

As in previous years, visitation to the City Beach precinct continues to grow and this has led to an increase in community expectations regarding the services we offer. There are more demands on our patrolling members with a more vigilant awareness of all beach activity required. Our patrolling members excelled and responded enthusiastically in meeting these expectations and maintaining high standards.

The standard of the volunteer service offered by the Club is a credit to every patrolling member. We had 20 Patrol Teams led by 20 Patrol Captains who collectively play a vital leadership role within our club. It is important that we acknowledge the level of responsibility that this group voluntarily assumes on behalf of every member and the wider community.

Our ‘One Club One Community’ vision is an integral part of the way the club thinks about itself and operates, and is the basis from which we engage with the expectations of both our members and our community.

The Club has engaged in local community events in association with our neighbour Floreat SLSC, including:

- Open water swim
- Anzac Day ceremony
- Youth Camp

We assisted the Rotary Club of Cambridge with its request for a host family from the Club and the Colliss family generously hosted a student from Argentina under the Rotary International Youth Exchange Programme.

Our Nipper section has seen an increase in membership and their presence has positively influenced the Sunday morning experience with The Galley, courtyard and promenade becoming a gathering place for club members.

We have had an increase in club-managed and catered functions for a variety of users and we have also been able to assist other health and community focused groups seeking to use our facilities. Our focus on club-managed functions will continue to grow.

This year we successfully presented the Maxima Awards and Recognition Evening. There were over 130 club members and guests that formally recognised the achievements of their fellow members. Congratulations to Arthur Bajada for receiving the Best Club Member Award and to Phil Green whose outstanding service across a number of areas of club life was recognised as the recipient of the President’s Medal.

With the Gym and Function Center now providing the much-needed additional revenue to fund our beach operations, our club volunteers can continue to provide the premium life saving service at City Beach. Looking to the future we hope that these operations can also provide more for our surf sports program.

Matthew Whinnen and Leon Musca, our resident Exercise Physiologists, have joined the team during the 2018/19 season. With our steady growth in membership they have done a great job in providing quality services and new initiatives to engage all cross sections of the community. Rachael Hughes has continued to build the function center and is developing our club's name and venue in this space. Kylie Leaman and Narelle Pyne have been fantastic behind the scenes, smooth club operation can always be attributed to them both. Rosemary Fracaro and Sonya Orso have

worked together well in the Galley. We hope, in the upcoming 2019/20 season, that we can provide something special in the Galley that will keep our members coming back for more.

Alisa Pearson, Sophie Wulff, and their team of hard-working volunteers have done a great job holding the shop together this season. They worked hard to transition the club from Finz to Kozii bathers. From the admin team, we are grateful that you gave us our Sundays off whilst the club is full of club members, Thank you.

Our major sponsors; Maxima Opportunity Group, GPA Empire Village, and Metro Motors Holden have provided the club with much needed support throughout the 2018/19 season and I hope that this can continue to develop through oncoming seasons.

The Town of Cambridge has been highly supportive of all new initiatives from our Club during the 2018/19 season, from rocks on the beach to shark alarms. It is great to have such a positive relationship with the local authorities and hope this relationship can continue to grow.

# FINANCIAL REPORT

Despite growth in membership numbers, the Club made an operating loss of \$10,213 for the 2018/19 financial year. Key highlights were:

- Total income received was \$879,343 compared to \$824,224 last year
- Income from membership fees is up on last year primarily due to higher Nipper registrations and an increase in gym memberships. Gym fees were \$160,153 (up from \$130,105 in 2017/18), with expenses including staff costs of \$119,930. The gym is also generating other income through personal training and massage services
- Sponsorship funding was significantly down on last year
- Expenses are higher than last year (\$889,555 compared to \$748,755 for 2017/18) primarily due to higher staff and administration costs
- The Galley members lounge traded at a loss due to higher than expected staff costs and trial breakfast trading hours. Sales revenue was \$87,117 with COGS of \$50,676 and staffing costs of \$64,100
- Expense control continues to be a focus for the Executive.

My personal thanks to the House Committee, Greg Johnston and Greg Trew, together with Kevin Hogg and Mark Holland. Their continued strong support throughout the year was greatly appreciated.

# MEMBERSHIP SERVICES REPORT

### The Galley

The last twelve months have been very much a learning experience as the Club transitioned from The Galley being managed by a professional chef offering a service to members, to a system consisting of a supervisor and mixture of voluntary and paid staff.

The planning for the change was initiated prior to the last AGM and considerable planning and research was completed by Narelle Pyne and her team before the current Board of Directors was settled. The major outcome of work completed was the significant improvement of recording and reporting of income and expenses of Galley operations. A better financial understanding will ultimately lead to improved operations in the future.

Thursday and Friday morning Breakers Breakfasts were trialled with Saturday mornings added to the mix later in the Season. We will continue to work on service and offering to increase the engagement with these initiatives.

Our usual Friday evenings at the club were also lacking in atmosphere and attendance this season. With external food options initially trialled it was clear that it was not collecting the support of previous years and therefore, towards the second half of the season these food offerings were removed to simply offer the bar to members.

While we can control staffing and offering levels, one factor we can't control is the weather. It was not kind to The Galley operations during the 2018/19 season and highlights the need for improved weather protection in the courtyard.

### Gym Services

Mathew Whinnen initiated an O/60s program for both Club and members of the community. The initiative has been well supported by both groups and furthers our goals of community involvement as well as increased member services. This initiative meets one of the Club's goals of involving the community, as well as promoting an active and healthy lifestyle. It is also a source of much needed income.

Leon Musca, an Exercise Physiologist and masseur, has joined our staff and both of his services have been well supported and receive positive reports.

The exercise classes conducted in mornings are also being well supported by the membership. Over time, more classes will be introduced as our active gym membership is growing, and so is the demand. A healthy lifestyle is something the club will continue to strive to provide for our membership. Physiotherapy services will be investigated and introduced when appropriate.

The Club is broadening its focus and beginning to strive for true financial independence. Patrols, education and surf sports is our core business however, the world is changing. We must evolve with it to have successful operations and maintain our safe beach environment. ○

# BEACH OPERATIONS REPORT

All key positions were filled on the Beach Operations Committee which resulted in growth and consolidation in equal measures. The non-voting positions of Chair and Secretary were once again taken by Chris Murphy and Susan Carrick, many thanks for keeping us on track during meetings and providing all the necessary support.

The Drone Patrol has gained traction this season thanks to Westpac sponsorship, great support from Rob Lund, SLSWA and a small but very keen group of budding Pilots. Early in the season 4 members were put through their training with Global Unmanned Services (GUS) followed by 2 more after Christmas. Progress was slow for these pilots to become signed off due to lack of mentors but with more fully accredited pilots in the club this should not be an issue going forward. We are now in a very strong position to fly into next season with regular drone coverage of morning patrols.

The IRB “family” has once again been outstanding throughout the season providing an essential limb to life saving at the Club. They are true examples of “clubbies” providing education opportunities, providing help at our external fundraising events, providing support on Sunday mornings as well as competing in a variety of arenas and being around of Friday evenings to support the Galley.

The new Education Officers ensured that a strong base was created to allow for a more comprehensive planned programme next season.

Patrols continued to provide a first class service to the visitors to City Beach. Thank you to all our volunteers who remain proficient and patrol weekend in and weekend out from October to April.

On a cold August morning our life savers donned their wetsuits to help out at the inaugural Dare to Care – Swim for Conquer Cystic Fibrosis, thank you to the small team for volunteering to help CFWA raise much needed funds for research.

We received vital funds by supplying water safety for various external events including:

- Rottnest Triathlon.
- Port to Pub.
- Town of Cambridge Open Water Swim.
- Chung Wah Cultural Festival – Dragon Boat Racing, Burswood.
- Chung Wah Cultural Festival – Lantern Launching, Burswood.

Without the dedication and commitment of a few members we would struggle to supply enough lifesavers to cover these events. We need more members to step up and volunteer to help with these fundraising events and are currently looking at ways to get more members involved.

Despite being three years post build, stones and rocks were an issue early in the season. Once the Town of Cambridge understood the extent of the problem they provided a regular beach and sand cleaning operation which alleviated the problem to some extent. This allowed Sunday morning activities to move further north, allowing better and safer access for vehicles down the ramp to the beach. By next season I’m sure some more rocks will have raised their ugly heads!

## YOUTH REPORT

**The City of Perth Surf Life Saving Club Youth (U14s-U17s) had a highly successful season in many aspects of the club, from competitions to education, volunteering to patrolling, and everything in between.**

The objectives of our Youth programme follow those of the Club - 'One Club, One Community'. The Youth Committee believe in providing a safe environment where our Youth members can experience as many aspects of the surfclub as possible. We provide many opportunities around fitness, fun, competition, friendship, development and community service.

There were 93 Youth signed up for the 2018/19 season which was an increase of 16% from the previous year. For two consecutive years there has been an increase in Youth memberships at City of Perth SLSC. Our objective is to continue to increase Youth memberships each year by providing interesting programmes based around our objectives.



Youth members continue to play a significant role in assisting with club activities from helping in the Galley on a Sunday morning, providing Nipper water safety and providing important water safety at major public events such as the Triple S Ski Series, the Port to Pub and the recent Dragon Boat Festival.

The season started with different sections of the club coming to talk to the Youth as part of the Youth Information Session. Many of the Youth are transitioning from Nippers or are new to the club so these sessions are very important to learn about what the club offers for the Youth. It also enabled the Youth to meet coaches and athletes from these different sections such as competition, surf boats, IRBs, Champion Lifesaver and First Aid.

Early in the season, the Youth enjoyed the Wellness Day which included a HIIT session with Matthew Whinnen from the gym. Our Club Captain, Gabrielle Murphy came to talk to the group about the upcoming World Surf Lifesaving Championships that were held in November 2018 and the challenges with working and training. Many local businesses provided healthy

options for the Youth to try and we appreciate their ongoing support.

'Have a Go' days continued, and Youth members had a chance to try IRBs, surf boats and surf skis. The 'Have a Go' day with the IRBs continue to be very popular with the Youth and we are very appreciative of their ongoing support. The 'Have a Go' day for surfboats and surf skis was conducted at Matilda Bay with strong support from the surf ski coaches and the surf boat section of the club. These days are important for the Youth members to experience different aspects of the club that they may wish to join.

Many club members nominated for the U14/U15 TOAD Camp with a record 4 City of Perth U14s being selected to attend - Ben Adams, Joshua Boulton, James McNiff and Dylan Poole. Two U17s, Tamsyn Ireland, Meng Houng Chroek were selected for the U17s Rise Up Camp.

The City of Perth SLSC Club was very proud to be involved with the inaugural City of Perth and Floreat Surf Life Saving Club Youth Camp held in January 2019. Members from City of Perth SLSC that attended were: Grace Young; Elinor Webster;

Ashley Eldon, Charlotte McDermid; Sophie Baron-Hay; Sienna Greig and Sihan Shen. Activities were held at both clubs with many City of Perth coaches and athletes running several sessions during the camp.

During the season, 23 Youth gained their Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) qualification and began patrolling for the first time this season. In addition, 14 Youth achieved their Bronze Medallion. These qualifications are a major focus for the Youth programme and a platform for greater involvement within the club.

The Youth continued to have many successes in carnivals competing in local and country carnivals, the Surf League series, the States and the Aussies. Five Youth members were announced as part of the Western Suns Development Squad. For the second year Alex Slocombe (U15) and Imogen Herrington (U15) were selected and three U14s were selected: Nathan Hunt; Owen Lilleyman and Alice Williams.

Grace Young (U14) was awarded the SLSWA Youth Club Achiever Award for City of Perth SLSC. Also, congratulations to Paige Bajada and

Riley Walker for being nominated for the SLSWA Awards of Excellence Young Volunteer of the Year and Thomas Noordzy who was nominated for the Youth Lifesaver of the Year.

# IRB REPORT

In the 2018/19 Season the IRB section continued to build its capability and sustainability. The highlights include:

**Introduction of Jet Ski Operations**  
The Club partnered with SLSWA to see a Jet Ski based at City of Perth. The Jet Ski has proved to be a very useful addition to the IRB fleet and has been successfully deployed on patrol, in several Club events and in supporting inter-club/SLSWA water safety during the Abalone Season.

**Training & Proficiency**  
Several IRB Driver and IRB Crew training courses have been successfully completed during the Season resulting in the sign-off of six new Drivers and thirteen Crew. This included supporting the development of members of neighbouring surf clubs who do not have the infrastructure or numbers to viably run their own training.

It is pleasing to note that just under two-thirds of IRB Driver and Crew candidates signed off this Season are female. This both promotes the diversity of the section and reinforces the fact that IRB and Jet Ski operation is well within the reach of any Club member who aspires to these awards. The success of the IRB training program is also well demonstrated with more than ten IRB Crew currently at various stages of progress towards their IRB Driver Silver Medallion Award.

An in-house Jet Ski course, facilitated by SLSWA, was also successfully completed during the Season. This resulted in the sign-off of seven RWC Operators. The IRB Section provided Assessors for in-house and inter-club IRB Driver and Crew assessments.

IRB Driver and Crew training continues. Planning is also underway for an intake of IRB Drivers to be trained and signed-off as RWC Operators over the next six months.

**Provision of Water Safety Services**  
The IRB Section was again a key contributor to intra- and inter-Club, SLSWA co-ordinated and external events, providing both IRB and Jet Ski water safety support including the following:

- Sunday Nippers & Club Swim.
- SRC & Bronze Medallion Assessment & Requals.
- Junior & Senior Carnivals including State Championships.
- Aussies.
- Abalone Patrol.
- Sunset Surf Ski Series.
- Cambridge Open Water Swim.
- Port to Pub.
- Chung Wah Association Dragon Boat Racing & Lotus Flower Ceremony.

A number of these external events simultaneously generated income for the Club and promoted the City of Perth SLSC brand. It should be noted that the IRB Section’s involvement in Club activities extended well beyond the water with a number of the Team willingly volunteering to provide shore-based support for several events.

**IRB Racing**  
At time of writing, the IRB Racing Season is in full swing. City of Perth continues its association with Floreat SLSC in combined Race training and competition. The City component of the Racing Team is very much in a transition and consolidation phase. The aim is to increase participant numbers, particularly Drivers, to enable City to field its own teams at Racing competition next season whilst still training and jointly entering IRB racing carnivals with Floreat.

Another busy and successful Season for the IRB Section. Thank you to all IRB and Jet Ski personnel for their outstanding efforts. Particular thanks needs to go to the Section’s Trainers and Assessors for the great outcomes achieved.

Special mention and thanks goes to Metro Motors Holden for yet again providing the Club with a support vehicle for the Season - without which beach operations would be severely restricted; and to SLSWA for its patronage in establishing Jet Ski operations at City of Perth SLSC.

Undoubtedly, the 2019/20 Season will be even bigger and better for the IRB Section and Club. ○

# LIFE SAVING EVENTS & FIRST AID REPORT

The First Aid competition has been dwindling on the West Coast for several years, so for City's First Aid Team, the 2018/19 season was all about building; building the team and building the momentum of the competition in WA. In the interest of providing strong competition for our own competitors, the invite was sent out to all WA metro clubs to join City's weekly first aid training and we began recruiting more actively within our own club. The results were promising with City's team doubling in size and training sessions seeing up to 22 members from across four different clubs.

Come the State Championships, City was able to field teams in every age group, including four Opens teams. A long day of competition saw scenarios with injuries ranging from simple broken bones to difficult-to-deal-with drug affected patients. New recruits, Alicia Jones

and Kate De Marchi, walked away with a silver medal in the U15s competition. Unfortunately, not enough teams were fielded in the U17s and U19s scenarios for points to be awarded, but each of these teams did themselves proud by aging up to compete in a tough Opens event. This scenario put teams through their paces and a seamless performance from City duo Ingrid Smith and Nathan Scott had defending champions Christine Burke and Katie Schutze on the edge of their seats whilst waiting for the results. But it wasn't quite enough and Katie and Christine took home the gold whilst the silver went to Nathan and Ingrid just ten points – less than 1% – behind.

With most members unable to travel for the Aussies, it was a short season for the First Aid team, but a promising one for the future of the competition in the state.

City's Lifesaving Team is as-ever indebted to the parents, friends and club-members that continue to donate their time and skills in the form of officiating, scenario-writing and acting so that competitions can run. Special thanks to my co-coach Christine Burke and First Aid State Championships Head Referee Natalie Law who both put countless volunteer hours into the competition this season. ○

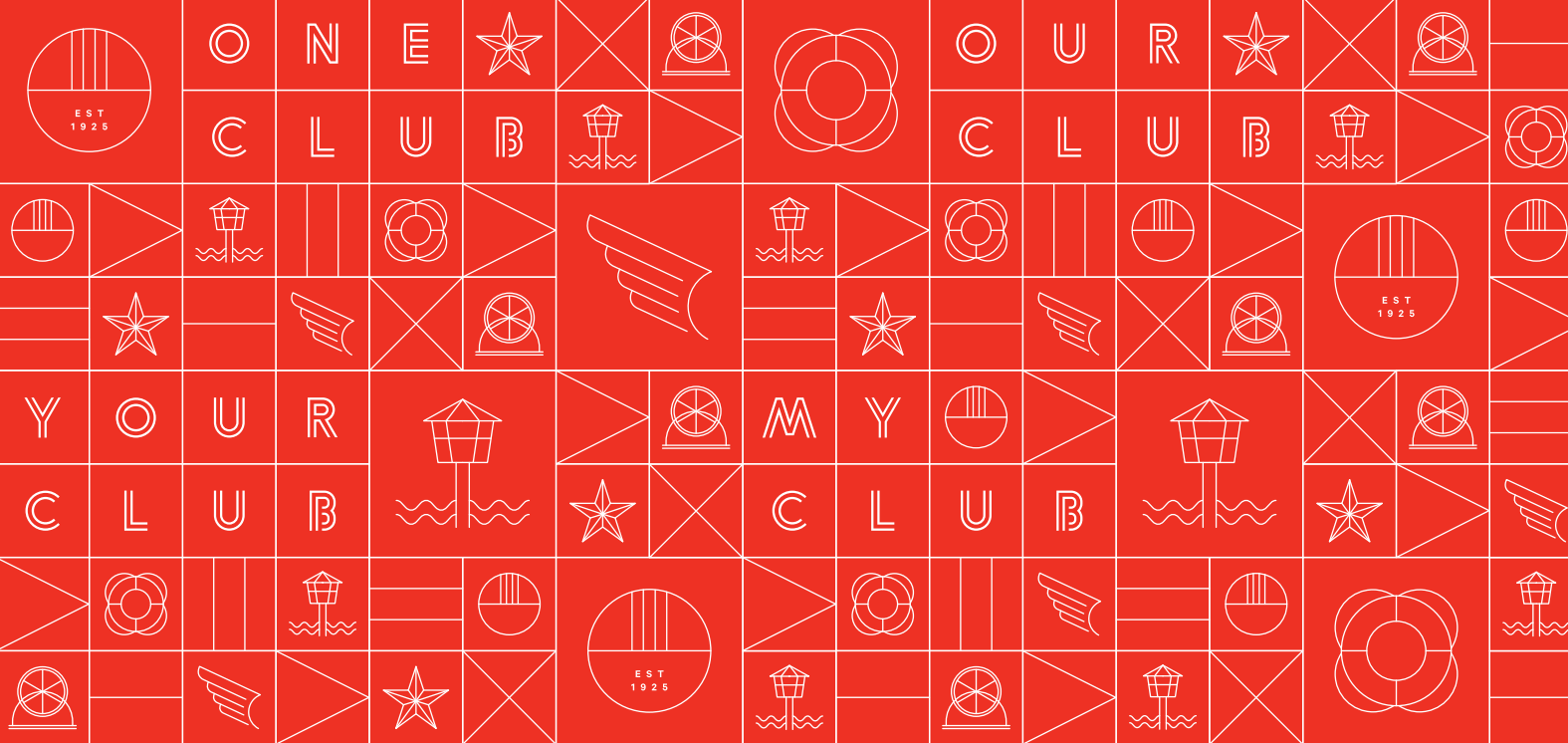

Circulated to 1,800 members, the 100 DOLLAR PLUS CLUB Business Directory will be included in City News each week for businesses to be supported by the City of Perth SLSC Membership and City Beach community.

To be included in this initiative, the Club ask businesses to make a bronze (\$100) silver (\$300) or gold (\$500+) donation to help the City of Perth SLSC provide the premium beach service we have become accustomed to since establishment in 1925.

With the new development of the City Beach precinct, beach visitation has increased by over 300% in the last season. It is of most importance for our volunteer lifesavers to obtain the best equipment, training and education to keep the City Beach community and beach goers safe. 

## MILESTONES

Our goal for the 100 DOLLAR PLUS CLUB in the 2018/19 season was to raise \$10,000 to assist with beach operations. We set four separate \$2,500 milestones to celebrate when our 100 DOLLAR PLUS CLUB grows to smash the donation targets. Unfortunately we did not reach our goal, however we have created a foundation of support.

#### MILESTONE 1 - SHARK ALARM

The funds from our first milestone were to be allocated to setup and install a shark alarm system. However, the Town of Cambridge advised us of their plan to undertake and fund this project. Due to their assistance, we are now able to allocate this money to our second milestone.


#### MILESTONE 2 - FUEL AND MAINTENANCE FOR IRB AND JET SKIS

Our second milestone was allocated to fuel and maintenance for our IRB and jet skis. With the additional beach visitation, our IRB operators have been run off their feet with rescues and preventative actions. It is expensive to keep these vehicles in the water but the IRBs and jet skis provide an integral service on our beach.

#### MILESTONE 3 - YOUTH PROGRAM

Our third milestone invested in our Youth program. We try to assist where possible in sending our Youth members to TOAD Camp and Rise Up Camp. These camps teach valuable surf, leadership, and teamwork skills to the up and coming generation who will one day be managing our beach.

#### MILESTONE 4 - NIPPER TRAILER

Our fourth milestone was dedicated to our Nipper program to purchase a Nipper beach operation and competition trailer. This trailer will help store and move Nipper equipment on both Sunday Nippers and Nipper competitions. This trailer will ensure kids have the correct equipment available to them to develop and excel in the surf. We did not reach this milestone, however with additional grant application money we are looking to purchase our nipper trailer in winter of 2019.

# FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS  
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2019

The financial statements cover City of Perth SLSC Inc as an individual entity. City of Perth SLSC Inc is a not-for-profit Association incorporated in Western Australia under the *Associations Incorporation Act (WA) 2015* ('the Act').

- The principal activities of the Association for the year ended 30 April 2019 were
- To maintain efficient patrolling of the beach under the control of the Club.
  - To ensure the most effective methods of rescuing persons in distress, and the resuscitation of the apparently drowned by study and practice of the methods of Surf Life Saving as taught by "Surf Life Saving Australia Limited".
  - To provide for the recreational, social, sporting and educational needs of the members.

The functional and presentation currency of City of Perth SLSC Inc is Australian dollars.

The financial report was authorised for issue by the Committee of Management on 29 May 2019.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1        **Basis of Preparation**

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards – Related Disclosure Requirements and the Act.

2        **Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

(a)        **Income Tax**

The Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

(b)        **Leases**

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all of the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses on a straight-line basis over the life of the lease term.

Lease incentives under operating leases are recognised as a liability and amortised on a straight-line basis over the life of the lease term.

(c)        **Revenue and other income**

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Association and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS  
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2019

**Sale of goods**

Revenue is recognised on transfer of goods to the customer as this is deemed to be the point in time when risks and rewards are transferred and there is no longer any ownership or effective control over the goods.

**Grant revenue**

Grant revenue is recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income when the entity obtains control of the grant, it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

When grant revenue is received whereby the entity incurs an obligation to deliver economic value directly back to the contributor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction and the grant revenue is recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until the service has been delivered to the contributor, otherwise the grant is recognised as income on receipt.

City of Perth SLSC Inc receives non-reciprocal contributions of assets from the government and other parties for zero or a nominal value. These assets are recognised at fair value on the date of acquisition in the statement of financial position, with a corresponding amount of income recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

**Government grants**

Government grants are recognised at fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all grant conditions will be met. Grants relating to expense items are recognised as income over the periods necessary to match the grant to the costs they are compensating. Grants relating to assets are credited to deferred income at fair value and are credited to income over the expected useful life of the asset on a straight-line basis.

**Donations**

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

**Interest revenue**

Interest is recognised using the effective interest method.

**Rendering of services**

Revenue in relation to rendering of services is recognised depending on whether the outcome of the services can be estimated reliably. If the outcome can be estimated reliably then the stage of completion of the services is used to determine the appropriate level of revenue to be recognised in the period.

If the outcome cannot be reliably estimated then revenue is recognised to the extent of expenses recognised that are recoverable.

**Gain on disposal of non-current assets**

When a non-current asset is disposed, the gain or loss is calculated by comparing proceeds received with its carrying amount and is taken to profit or loss.

After initial recognition these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. Any change in their value is recognised in profit or loss.

The Association's trade and other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments.

Significant receivables are considered for impairment on an individual asset basis when they are past due at the reporting date or when objective evidence is received that a specific counterparty will default.

The amount of the impairment is the difference between the net carrying amount and the present value of the future expected cash flows associated with the impaired receivable.

In some circumstances, the Association renegotiates repayment terms with customers which may lead to changes in the timing of the payments, the Association does not necessarily consider the balance to be impaired, however assessment is made on a case-by-case basis.

*Financial liabilities*

Financial liabilities are classified as either financial liabilities 'at fair value through profit or loss' or other financial liabilities depending on the purpose for which the liability was acquired. Although the Association uses derivative financial instruments in economic hedges of currency and interest rate risk, it does not hedge account for these transactions.

The Association's financial liabilities include borrowings, trade and other payables (including finance lease liabilities), which are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

*Impairment of financial assets*

At the end of the reporting period the Association assesses whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset or group of financial assets is impaired.

*Financial assets at amortised cost*

If there is objective evidence that an impairment loss on financial assets carried at amortised cost has been incurred, the amount of the loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial assets original effective interest rate.

Impairment on loans and receivables is reduced through the use of an allowance accounts, all other impairment losses on financial assets at amortised cost are taken directly to the asset.

Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited against other expenses in profit or loss.

(i) **Cash and cash equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Bank overdrafts also form part of cash equivalents for the purpose of the statement of cash flows and are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

(j) **Employee benefits**

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

3 **Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments**

The directors make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

The significant estimates and judgements made have been described below.

**Key estimates - receivables**

The receivables at reporting date have been reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that any of the receivables are impaired. An impairment provision is included for any receivable where the entire balance is not considered collectible. The impairment provision is based on the best information at the reporting date.

**Key estimates - inventory**

Each item on inventory is reviewed on an annual basis to determine whether it is being carried at higher than its net realisable value. During the year, management have written down inventory based on best estimate of the net realisable value, although until the time that inventory is sold this is an estimate.




