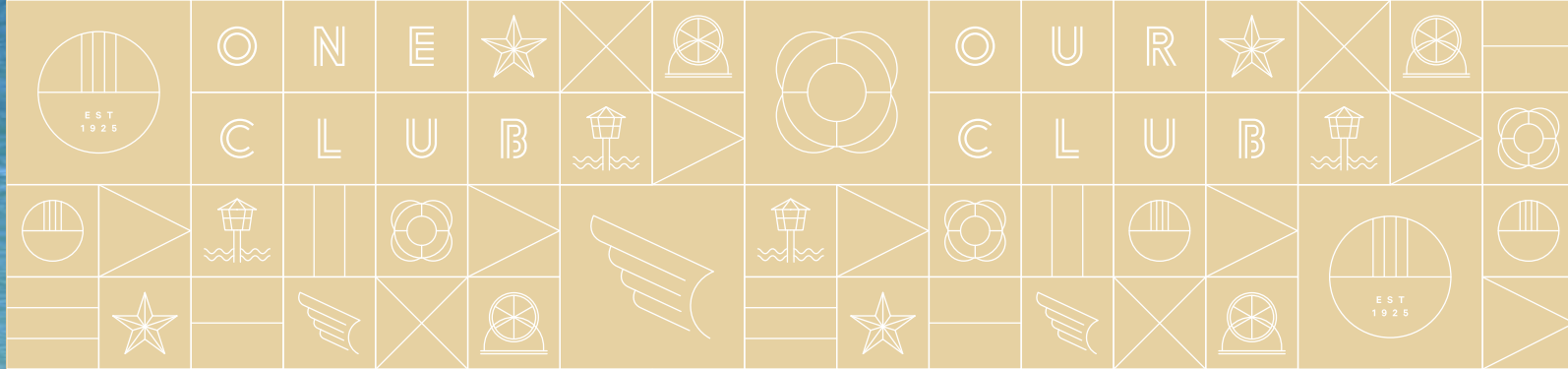

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PRESIDENT REPORT

It is with pleasure that I present the 2019/20 Annual Report. To say that this has been an unusual year would be an understatement.



On behalf of the Executive Committee and the Administration team, thank you to all members for your support and understanding during this most difficult time. Like all clubs and businesses, COVID-19 restrictions have had a significant impact on the City of Perth SLSC.

Whilst we were unable to complete the surf season in our traditional way, we should not forget the many positives that have been achieved.

Our membership numbers have remained strong and our overall financial position, even during this period, is sound. We have continued to negotiate the challenges of operating in the building, while managing a contemporary surf lifesaving and community club. We have maintained strategic focus on our relevance in the broader community, with health and wellbeing activities central to our strategic plan.

I need to recognise the efforts of our Administration team in remaining positive during this difficult period. Initiatives, such as the online gym classes, provided members with an exercise option while maintaining a connection with the Club. We also got to meet Colin ‘the rabbit’ who has assumed cult-like status with the online participants.

Our patrolling members again excelled this season and the standard of the volunteer service offered by the Club is a credit to every patrolling member. The 18 Patrol Teams led by the 18 Patrol Captains collectively play a vital leadership role within our club. It is important that we acknowledge the level of responsibility that this group voluntarily assumes on behalf of every member and the wider community. Congratulations to Peter Johnson whose outstanding service to patrolling at City of Perth was recognised in the award of the President’s Medal.

Under our ‘ONE CLUB, ONE COMMUNITY’ vision, the Club engaged in local community events in association with the Town of Cambridge and the City Beach Precinct. We also assisted in organising the Cambridge Open Water Swim in association with Floreat SLSC.

The Woodside Nippers sponsorship, delivered through SLSWA, benefited our overall Club and we are deeply appreciative of this initiative. Our Nipper membership continues to grow and their lively presence has positively influenced the Sunday morning experience with the courtyard and promenade becoming a gathering place for club members.

Some-Day Coffee Co.’s involvement in our club café has added another layer to the Sunday morning experience. We look forward to continuing our relationship.

The Club’s Education and training sections are growing with wonderful achievements highlighted in this report. Under the guidance of Angela Razvi, our Youth program has expanded and is delivering terrific results.

Even with a reduced surf sports program, our members still excelled with success in winning the 2020 WA Surf League, and great results at the national competitions, the Super Surf Team League and the Australian Surf Rowers League Open.

The Sunset Surf Ski Series lifted to another level this season and it was terrific to see our Club members and Club Rooms at the centre of the competition.

The Executive supported an increased focus on functions, with Rachael Hughes’ skills fitting in well as the Function Coordinator. We continue to receive a positive response from the community and the increased revenue is a major factor in our improved financial position.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Despite a challenging year due to COVID-19, the Club made an operating profit of \$33,345 for the 2019/20 financial year. Key highlights were:

- Total income received was \$908,884 compared to \$879,343 last year
- Income from membership fees is up on last year primarily due to higher Nipper registrations and an increase in Community Associates. Gym fees were \$136,820 compared to \$160,153 in 2018/19 as a result of the gym being closed during COVID-19, with expenses including staff costs of \$71,072. The gym is also generating other income through personal training and massage services
- Funds received from Sponsorship, Grants and Fundraising was \$112,597 compared to \$111,431 in 2018/19
- Income from functions and room hire was significantly higher than last year at \$144,233 despite cancellations due to COVID-19
- Total expenses were slightly lower than last year (\$875,539 compared to \$889,556 for 2018/19)
- Expense control continues to be a focus for the Executive

BEACH OPERATIONS REPORT

City Beach is a busy hub for the community, and the Beach Operations Team is responsible for all activities that take place on the beach. The team remained unchanged from last season, and I would like to thank them all for their ongoing enthusiasm and energy. It continues to be a privilege to work alongside this group consisting of:

- **Patrols** – Graham Wimbridge
- **Education** - Matthew Slattery and Phil Green
- **Mobile Services** – Arthur Bajada, Time Speer and Mike Lowry
- **First Aid** – Nat Speer

Patrolling City Beach is the core business of our surf club. We would not be able to provide this vital service for the Town of Cambridge without the dedication of our volunteers. In many different roles, they step up week after week throughout the year to ensure that our beach is a safe place to visit. A huge thank you to all our members - young and old, new and experienced - who make our operation possible.

Consolidating on the strong base they created last season, our Education Officers, together with our trainers and assessors, provided first class courses for our members. Stephen Reynolds once again coordinated the requals in an organised and timely manner.

As always, the mobile services team were involved at every turn, providing essential support to the beach operations. The vibrant, energetic, and fun atmosphere around the IRB shed is a constant. Jet Ski drivers made themselves available for water safety on the Abalone days, for which we received funds from Surf Life Saving Western Australia.

Our first aid room is always well-stocked and organised thanks to the ongoing efforts of Nat Speer. Thankfully, she was available during the last few weeks of the season to provide guidance and support for the patrols, ensuring that we were able to comply with Surf Life Saving Western Australia's recommendations as the COVID-19 situation unfolded.

A goal outlined at the start of the season was to have an operational drone on Sunday mornings. We were able to achieve this goal thanks to our returning pilots and four new ones.

Although not on the beach committee, the following members provided essential input to support beach operations:

- **Drones** – Jeff Scott
- **Radios** – Daniel Scott
- **Equipment & Board Maintenance** – Mark Anderson

Holden Metro Motors and Morley Mitsubishi once again generously sponsored a vehicle for the duration of the patrolling season – having an extra vehicle on the beach to support the ATV is invaluable. An Advantage Community Grant of \$1500 was received from “Realestate.com.au”, which was used to finance the purchase of a rescue mannequin for the Mobile Services Team. The trainers had asked for a mannequin so that training and rescue drills are able to proceed throughout the winter months when volunteers are not so keen to jump into the cold winter swells. Thanks to club member Rob Walker who helped obtain this grant! The club always welcomes information about grant opportunities, large or small - please contact the office with any leads. As this example shows, there are grants out there - we just need to know about them.

In conjunction with Floreat Surf Life Saving Club, we ran the second Cambridge Open Water Swim in early February from the Floreat club rooms. Numbers were slightly increased from the previous year and funds were raised. Next year, the swim will be run out of our club, so we need to take the opportunity to grow the event further and ensure that it is a recognised event on the open water swimming calendar.

Thanks to Susan Carrick who has once again been responsible for producing agendas and minutes for the Beach Committee, Chris Murphy for chairing the beach committee meetings, and to the Administration for their continued dedication and support. ○

YOUTH REPORT

The City of Perth Surf Life Saving Club Youth (U14s-U17s) had a highly successful season in many aspects of the club, from competitions to education, volunteering to patrolling, and everything in between.

The objectives of our Youth programme follow those of the Club - 'ONE CLUB, ONE COMMUNITY'. The Youth Committee believe in providing a safe environment where our Youth members can experience as many aspects of the surf club as possible. We provide many opportunities around fitness, fun, competition, friendship, development and community service.

There were 110 Youth (U14-U17s) signed up for the 2019/20 season, which is an increase of 18% from the previous year. For two consecutive years, there has been an increase in Youth memberships at City of Perth Surf Life Saving Club of 16% and 18%. Our objective is to continue to increase Youth memberships each year, by providing interesting programmes based around our club objectives.

Youth members continue to play a significant role in assisting with club

activities and external events, such as assisting with water safety for the Woodside Nippers, the Triple S Ski Series, Cambridge Open Water Swim and at Surf Lifesaving carnivals.

For the first time, there were three U17s - Ayesha Razvi, Mia Fraser and Sara Shular, who completed the Nipper Age Managers course and assisted the Nipper Age Managers U7s, U8s and U9s on Sunday mornings. They were able to bring their years of experience as Nippers and their competition skills to enrich the Nipper's experience.

Another first for this season, we had three Youth members - Grace Young, Innes Raeburn and Luka Allet, complete the Youth Officials course in January 2020 and were straight into their officiating duties at Surf Life Saving Western Australia carnivals, including the Woodside Nippers carnival that was held at City of Perth Surf Life Saving Club.

The season started with different sections of the club coming to talk to the Youth as part of the Youth Information Session. Many of the Youth are transitioning from Nippers or are new to the club, so these sessions are very important to learn about what the club offers for the Youth. It also enabled the Youth

to meet coaches and athletes from these different sections, such as competition, surf sports, surf boats, IRBs, R&R and First Aid.

During the season, the Youth enjoyed the Wellness Day which included a HIIT session with Matthew Whinnen from the gym. Meaghan Carrick, Director of Member Services, came to talk to the group about mental health and ways to stay mentally healthy. The Youth then got to make their own juices and smoothies with healthy options, and they were delicious!

Another important part of the Youth activities is the Club Swim with record numbers of Youth participating each week. In the end of season Club Swim awards, Remy Payne was 1st male, Euan McKay was runner up, Rosa Dickie was 1st female and Elinor Webster was runner up. Most Improved Swimmer was Trinity Williams and runner up was Zoe Gainer. The Best Family was won by the Longhorn family (Ralph and Ashley) and runners up were the Hunt family (Karin, Nathan, Timmy).

'Have a Go' days continued, and Youth members had a chance to try IRBs, surf boats and surf skis. The 'Have a Go' day with the IRBs continue to be very popular with the Youth and we are very appreciative

of their ongoing support. The 'Have a Go' day for surfboats and surf skis was conducted at City of Perth Surf Life Saving Club this year in near perfect conditions. These days are important for the Youth members to experience different aspects of the club that they may wish to join.

Many club members were nominated for the U14/U15 TOAD Camp, with four City of Perth Youth being selected to attend - Remy Payne, Rory Wallace, Sophie Baron-Hay and Grace Young. One U17s, Joshua Boulton, was selected for the Rise Up Camp.

During the season, a record of 40 Youth gained their Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) qualification and began patrolling for the first time this season. In addition, 26 Youth achieved their Bronze Medallion. These qualifications are a major focus for the Youth programme and a platform for greater involvement within the club. This could not be done without the support of the trainers who put in many hours.

The Youth continued to have many successes in carnivals - competing in local and country carnivals, and the Surf League series. Four Youth members were announced as part of the Western Suns Development Squad - Sophie Baron-Hay, Jules

Fredonnet, Nathan Hunt and Mia Nesbit. One Youth member, Nikita Fredonnet (U17), was announced as a member of the Western Suns Senior team.

The foundation of the patrols are our outstanding Captains and Vice Captains. Many of our Captains may be young but are highly competent as a result of the years they have spent at the Club or in lifesaving.

This season ran pretty smoothly from the outset. Our teams and arrangements building on the stability that has been established over the last few seasons. During the start of the season, October and November, there was some nice conditions for patrolling. The core of our teams getting back together and quickly settling into the routine, perhaps with the exception of the Patrol App – technology is good when it works and frustrating when it doesn't.

We had some fantastic results across the season including the selection of The City 5's to represent Western Australia at the ASRL as the Under 19's female team. The girls did an amazing job which resulted in them receiving a silver medal. Unfortunately,

due to conditions the girls were unable to compete for Western Australia in the interstate challenge. Attending the ASRL is an invaluable experience and it is amazing to see youth teams doing so well and breathing new life into our boat section. The success of the girls is due to their true grit and determination but is consolidated by their commitment to their team.

I can't wait to see what bright futures these wonderful girls have. City Black also made the trip east; this crew is now a staple of the ASRL competition and always perform well. City Black successfully managed to come away with a silver medal in the 160 category.

This season we have continued to develop our new sweeps. Patrick Anderson Loake and Tom Lowther continue to develop their skills, but the highlight has been the development of Kathleen Unwin. Kat is currently the only female competitive sweep in Western Australia. She is an extraordinary young woman who is committed to developing the boat section. She is breaking new ground and her skills continue to develop. She has had the support and guidance of all the sweeps in club including her crew the Phantoms who have provided invaluable guidance. Not only does she manage her time for training her crew as a sweep, she also is a valued rower in another crew. She

has taken on a huge challenge of balancing rowing and sweeping and has made it look easy. Kat is a shining light in the progress of boaties and what a bright future it will be. I can't wait to see what Kat will achieve in the future.

The boat section continues to focus on development and opportunity throughout the section. This season we provided a 'have a go evenings' on Wednesdays at Matilda bay. This was different from last year where we ran only one session. We wanted to ensure that we gave everyone the opportunity to try Surf Boats. Thank you to Tom Lowther for running these evenings, without him they would not have been possible. I am looking forward to next season and seeing some of our talented new rowers in a boat.

We look forward to a bigger and better season next year where we can battle it out to make up for the unfinished business of this season. I believe it will be a fantastic motivation for all of us to show what City of Perth Surf Life Saving Club is really made of. Bring on 2020/2021! ○

IRB REPORT

In the 2019/20 season the IRB section continued to build its capability and sustainability. The highlights include:

Continuing IRB and Jet Ski Operations

The Club continues to partner with Surf Life Saving Western Australia to maintain Jet Ski operation from the City of Perth Surf Life Saving Club. The Jet Ski has again supported patrols, Nipper Water Safety on most Sundays, the Sunset Ski Series, several club events and inter-club/ Surf Life Saving Western Australia water safety during the Abalone Season and COVID-19 patrols.

The IRB equipment inventory was complemented this season with a new E-Tec motor and associated hull provided by Surf Life Saving Australia and a new two stroke Mercury motor to support operations. Austal Ships also kindly donated a new beach trailer to the club for IRB launch and recovery.

Training & Proficiency

Several IRB Driver and IRB Crew training courses have been successfully completed during the season, resulting in the sign-off of seven new Drivers, eight Crew and two IRB Training Officers. City of Perth Surf Life Saving Club continues to cooperate with Floreat Surf Life Saving Club, including supporting the development of members of both clubs through shared training and assessment resources. The IRB section also arranged four discounted Recreational Skippers Ticket courses for IRB Driver candidates and other interested club members.

The female representation within IRB section remains strong with several new female Driver and Crew candidates trained by our newly qualified female trainer. We were also very pleased to see increased participation by the rowing section this year, with many of the newly qualified Drivers and Crew, also rowing for the club. The diversity of the section remains strong and reinforces the fact that IRB and Jet Ski operation is well within the reach of any club member who aspires to the IRB or RWC Silver Medallion Award.

The club now has eight qualified RWC operators who successfully completed the Jet Ski course last season, facilitated by Surf Life Saving Western Australia and requalified this season. In addition to this requalification, several of the qualified RWC operators also successfully completed a rock rescue course facilitated by Surf Life Saving Western Australia during the season.

The IRB section provided assessors for in-house and inter-club IRB Driver and Crew assessments.

IRB Driver and Crew training is planned for the winter season following easing of the current governmental isolation restrictions. There are several IRB Driver candidates preparing for assessment during the next six months. There is also ongoing discussion with Surf Life Saving Western Australia to train additional RWC Operators next season to increase the number of members qualified to support patrols.



Provision of Water Safety Services

The IRB Section was again a key contributor to intra- and inter-club, Surf Life Saving Western Australia coordinated and external events, providing both IRB and Jet Ski water safety support including the following:

- Sunday Nippers & Club Swim
- SRC & Bronze Medallion Assessment & Requalifications
- Junior & Senior Carnivals
- Abalone Patrol
- Sunset Surf Ski Series
- COVID-19 Patrols
- Cambridge Open Water Swim

A number of these external events simultaneously generated income for the club and promoted the City of Perth Surf Life Saving Club brand. It should be noted that the IRB section's involvement in club activities extended well beyond the water with a number of the team willingly volunteering to provide shore-based support for several events.

IRB Racing

Unfortunately, the IRB racing season has been curtailed this year due to isolation restrictions. City of Perth Surf Life Saving Club continues its association with Floreat Surf Life Saving Club in combined race training and competition. The City Racing Team is very much in a formative period and requires the training commitment of several members to grow the team skills. The aim is to increase participant numbers, particularly Drivers, to enable City of Perth Life Saving Club to field its own teams at racing competition in the future whilst still training and jointly entering IRB racing carnivals with Floreat.

Another busy and successful season for the IRB section. Thank you to all IRB and Jet Ski personnel for their outstanding efforts. Particular thanks need to go to the section's trainers and assessors for the great outcomes achieved.

Special mention and thanks to Metro Motors Holden and Morley Mitsubishi for again providing the club with a support vehicle for the season - which beach operations would be severely restricted without; and to Surf Life Saving Western Australia for its patronage in establishing Jet Ski operations at City of Perth Surf Life Saving Club.

In this uncertain time, the IRB section looks forward to return to normal operations in the 2020/21 season. See you on the beach. ○

This is a massive job and I'm sure most would agree that Steve has made this an almost seamless process once again.

We'd also like to thank Kylie in the office who has endured the many demands of the Education Officers and provided crucial support not only during the week, but also recording proficiencies and assessments on Sunday mornings.

The season just gone was a period of consolidation within the education section of the club, and now we must focus on developing a new generation of trainers and assessors to ensure the ongoing functions of our great club. There are many benefits of becoming a trainer within surf lifesaving, not the least of which is the opportunity to work alongside a great bunch of like-minded individuals and the sense of accomplishment felt when your training group successfully completes their award.

We are committed to providing more courses more frequently for all of our members, but to do so requires more trainers who can impart the valuable knowledge which they have collected themselves from surf over the years.

2020/21 will see a raft of changes introduced by Surf Life Saving Australia in the way that some of our courses are delivered, and we look forward to implementing these changes and streamlining some of our courses as a result. ○

HISTORIAN / ARCHIVIST REPORT

During the season, two temporary displays were placed in the cabinet in the hallway. The themes were:

- Club Teams – featuring photos and highlights of Club competitive teams to the Australian Championships from 1972 until 1992.
- Swim Stars – featured photos of some of City’s best swimmers from 1926 to recent times.

As part of our commitment to display the Club history and memorabilia permanently, a number of items were added to the Foyer:

- Photos of four previous clubrooms 1926, 1931, 1935 and 1970 were framed and mounted on the wall.
- A historic poster advertising the 1971 Australian Championships at City Beach was framed and mounted. The 1971 Aussies at City Beach is the only championship in Western Australia held outside of the Scarborough-Trigg Island stretch of beach, and on present carnival specifications seems it will remain unique.

- A framed memorial window recognising Norman Wilkinson, a President and Secretary in the 1930s. This window was displayed in the entrance area of the 1935 club rooms from its inception in March 1939 until 1970. It was then displayed in the Committee Room of the 1970 clubrooms from 1970 until 2014. It has been mounted above the Fire Panel.
- Assistance was given in the compilation of the Club Supporters’ recognition board for those who contributed to the new clubrooms funding.
- The official Town of Cambridge plaque commemorating the opening of the new building was mounted just inside the front entrance.

Thanks are extended to Murray Hughes for his assistance in all of these items.

A pleasing aspect of our job was to facilitate the viewing of club photos to families of deceased members and in some cases provide a copy. We also acknowledge a number of donations of photos and anecdotes from families of previous and current members. We welcome these donations as additions to our Club history and encourage all members to collect such items. ○

The financial statements cover City of Perth SLSC Inc as an individual entity. City of Perth SLSC Inc is a not-for-profit Association incorporated in Western Australia under the *Associations Incorporation Act (WA) 2015* ('the Act').

- The principal activities of the Association for the year ended 30 April 2020 were
- To maintain efficient patrolling of the beach under the control of the Club.
 - To ensure the most effective methods of rescuing persons in distress, and the resuscitation of the apparently drowned by study and practice of the methods of Surf Life Saving as taught by "Surf Life Saving Australia Limited".
 - To provide for the recreational, social, sporting and educational needs of the members.

The functional and presentation currency of City of Perth SLSC Inc is Australian dollars.

The financial report was authorised for issue by the Committee of Management on 27 June 2020.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

1 **Basis of Preparation**

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with the Australian Accounting Standards – Related Disclosure Requirements and the Act.

2 **Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

(a) **Income Tax**

The Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

(b) **Leases**

From 1 January 2020, as per AASB 16, any contract that is a lease, or contains a lease, are recognised as a right-of-use asset and a lease liability on the balance sheet over the term of the lease.

Right-of-use assets are depreciated from lease commencement date to the earlier of the end of the lease term or the end of the useful life of the right-of-use asset and the monthly payment for the lease reduces the lease liability.

On the statement of financial position, right-of-use assets are included in property, plant and equipment and lease liabilities are included in trade and other payables.

(c) **Revenue and other income**

Revenue is recognised when the amount of the revenue can be measured reliably, it is probable that economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the Association and specific criteria relating to the type of revenue as noted below, has been satisfied.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and is presented net of returns, discounts and rebates.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2020

Sale of goods

Revenue is recognised on transfer of goods to the customer as this is deemed to be the point in time when risks and rewards are transferred and there is no longer any ownership or effective control over the goods.

Grant revenue

Grant revenue is recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income when the entity obtains control of the grant, it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

When grant revenue is received whereby the entity incurs an obligation to deliver economic value directly back to the contributor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction and the grant revenue is recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until the service has been delivered to the contributor, otherwise the grant is recognised as income on receipt.

City of Perth SLSC Inc receives non-reciprocal contributions of assets from the government and other parties for zero or a nominal value. These assets are recognised at fair value on the date of acquisition in the statement of financial position, with a corresponding amount of income recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income.

Government grants

Government grants are recognised at fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all grant conditions will be met. Grants relating to expense items are recognised as income over the periods necessary to match the grant to the costs they are compensating. Grants relating to assets are credited to deferred income at fair value and are credited to income over the expected useful life of the asset on a straight-line basis.

Donations

Donations and bequests are recognised as revenue when received.

Interest revenue

Interest is recognised using the effective interest method.

Rendering of services

Revenue in relation to rendering of services is recognised depending on whether the outcome of the services can be estimated reliably. If the outcome can be estimated reliably then the stage of completion of the services is used to determine the appropriate level of revenue to be recognised in the period.

If the outcome cannot be reliably estimated, then revenue is recognised to the extent of expenses recognised that are recoverable.

The core principle of AASB 15 is that revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the Association expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2020

Revenue is recognised by applying a five-step model as follows:

- 1. Identify the contract with the customer
- 2. Identify the performance obligations
- 3. Determine the transaction price
- 4. Allocate the transaction price to the performance obligations

Recognise revenue as and when control of the performance obligations is transferred

Gain on disposal of non-current assets

When a non-current asset is disposed, the gain or loss is calculated by comparing proceeds received with its carrying amount and is taken to profit or loss.

Other income

Other income is recognised on an accruals basis when the Association is entitled to it.

(d) Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of a qualifying asset are capitalised as part of the cost of that asset.

All other borrowing costs are recognised as an expense in the period in which they are incurred.

(e) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payable are stated inclusive of GST.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included as part of receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

(f) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Inventories acquired at no cost, or for nominal consideration are valued at the current replacement cost as at the date of acquisition, which is the deemed cost.

(g) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.

Items of property, plant and equipment acquired for nil or nominal consideration have been recorded at the acquisition date fair value.

Where the cost model is used, the asset is carried at its cost less any accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses. Costs include purchase price, other directly attributable costs and the initial estimate of the costs of dismantling and restoring the asset, where applicable.

Assets measured using the revaluation model are carried at fair value at the revaluation date less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Revaluations are performed whenever there is a material movement in the value of an asset under the revaluation model.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured using the revaluation model.

Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment, excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the assets useful life to the Association, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

Leased assets and leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or their estimated useful life.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable asset are shown below:

Fixed asset class	Depreciation rate
Furniture, Fixtures and Fittings	5% - 20%
Competition Equipment	10%-20%
Leasehold improvements	5% - 20%

At the end of each annual reporting period, the depreciation method, useful life and residual value of each asset is reviewed. Any revisions are accounted for prospectively as a change in estimate.

(h) Financial instruments

Financial instruments are recognised initially using trade date accounting, i.e. on the date that the Association becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

On initial recognition, all financial instruments are measured at fair value plus transaction costs (except for instruments measured at fair value through profit or loss where transaction costs are expensed as incurred).

Financial Assets

Financial assets are divided into the following categories which are described in detail below:

- loans and receivables;

Financial assets are assigned to the different categories on initial recognition, depending on the characteristics of the instrument and its purpose. A financial instrument's category is relevant to the way it is measured and whether any resulting income and expenses are recognised in profit or loss or in other comprehensive income.

All income and expenses relating to financial assets are recognised in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income in the ‘finance income’ or ‘finance costs’ line item respectively.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They arise principally through the provision of goods and services to customers but also incorporate other types of contractual monetary assets.

After initial recognition these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. Any change in their value is recognised in profit or loss.

The Association’s trade and other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments.

Significant receivables are considered for impairment on an individual asset basis when they are past due at the reporting date or when objective evidence is received that a specific counterparty will default.

The amount of the impairment is the difference between the net carrying amount and the present value of the future expected cash flows associated with the impaired receivable.

In some circumstances, the Association renegotiates repayment terms with customers which may lead to changes in the timing of the payments, the Association does not necessarily consider the balance to be impaired, however assessment is made on a case-by-case basis.

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are classified as either financial liabilities ‘at fair value through profit or loss’ or other financial liabilities depending on the purpose for which the liability was acquired. Although the Association uses derivative financial instruments in economic hedges of currency and interest rate risk, it does not hedge account for these transactions.

The Association’s financial liabilities include borrowings, trade and other payables (including finance lease liabilities), which are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

Impairment of financial assets

At the end of the reporting period the Association assesses whether there is any objective evidence that a financial asset or group of financial assets is impaired.

Financial assets at amortised cost

If there is objective evidence that an impairment loss on financial assets carried at amortised cost has been incurred, the amount of the loss is measured as the difference between the asset’s carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial assets original effective interest rate.

Impairment on loans and receivables is reduced through the use of an allowance accounts, all other impairment losses on financial assets at amortised cost are taken directly to the asset.

Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited against other expenses in profit or loss.

(i) **Cash and cash equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Bank overdrafts also form part of cash equivalents for the purpose of the statement of cash flows and are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

(j) **Employee benefits**

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

3 **Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments**

The directors make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

The significant estimates and judgements made have been described below.

Key estimates - receivables

The receivables at reporting date have been reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that any of the receivables are impaired. An impairment provision is included for any receivable where the entire balance is not considered collectible. The impairment provision is based on the best information at the reporting date.

Key estimates - inventory

Each item on inventory is reviewed on an annual basis to determine whether it is being carried at higher than its net realisable value. During the year, management have written down inventory based on best estimate of the net realisable value, although until the time that inventory is sold this is an estimate.

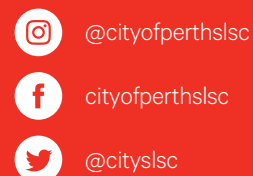
